Dear Wildcat Community,



This helps with our district-wide goal of increasing student attendance and promotes continuity with learning.

This month's newsletter highlights our Facilities Department, led by Mr. Louis Zver. Not only is Mr. Zver civil-service certified as a Director of Facilities II, he is also the Secretary of the Southern Finger Lakes Chapter of the New York State School Facilities Association. Serving as part of the keynote address during the recent NYS Facilities Directors Association Conference, Mr. Zver represented Jasper-Troupsburg well by detailing the NYSERDA Clean Schools Project in which our district is participating.

Our Facilities Department is comprised of 8 cleaners and 2 maintenance staff. These ten men and women are responsible for cleaning and maintaining over 90,000 sq. ft. of buildings daily. They also care for over 40 acres of property. Certified in both Asbestos and Hazardous Materials Handling, the Facilities Team takes pride in the care that goes into monitoring chemical ratios in cleaning products, water testing, and performing generator and boiler checks. Snow removal, painting, renovations, and repairs are taken care of in-house whenever possible thanks to the varied skill set of this dedicated group.

School Cleaner Day was October 2, but the work of the Facilities Department is appreciated every day! Thank you to the team for the extra effort that goes into making Jasper-Troupsburg safe, clean, and so attractive.

Strategic Planning with Education Elements

"Implementing a Strategic Plan defines a district's legacy."

What is Strategic Planning in Education?

Strategic planning is the process of setting goals, deciding on actions to achieve those goals, and mobilizing the resources needed to take those actions. A strategic plan describes how goals will be achieved using available resources.

What is the importance of Strategic Planning in Education?

- 1. A strategic plan articulates a shared vision, mission and values.
- 2. A strategic plan effectively organizes schools, staff, and time.
- 3. A strategic plan defines how success is measured.
- 4. A strategic plan helps with decision-making, responsiveness, and innovation.
- 5. A strategic plan increases communication and engagement.
- 6. A strategic plan keeps everyone in a school community connected.
- 7. The best reason of all for strategic planning comes back to every great school's number one priority: students.

Why is the district using Education Elements to facilitate the creation of Jasper-Troupsburg's Strategic Plan?

Knowing that the current JTCSD Strategic Plan was outdated, the district began the task of investigating available resources for the development of an updated Strategic Plan. There are various organizations that assist with Strategic Planning in schools, and there are some school districts that choose to write their Strategic Plan without outside support. Because our goal is to incorporate student and community voice in addition to the voice of faculty and staff in the new Strategic Plan, Jasper-Troupsburg is utilizing the help of Education Elements for this work. In looking at multiple programs, Education Elements was the one that stood out above the others as having *stakeholder input as the primary source of plan development*. The funding source of this work is the Community Schools Grant, allowing for community input without a cost to taxpayers.

How will community members, students, parents, faculty and staff be able to provide input?

In early December, Education Elements will conduct a survey of all interest groups in addition to hosting multiple opportunities to participate in virtual discussions with the facilitators from Education Elements. While the Board of Education and Jasper-Troupsburg administrators absolutely value the thoughts about our district and goals for our district that our Wildcat Community has, BOE and administration will not be part of the virtual discussions. This provides stakeholders with the opportunity to openly discuss both items of concern and celebration.

How is the Strategic Plan written?

Using information from surveys and the virtual discussions, Education Elements will provide a Steering Team and the Project Team with a summary that will be used to identify actionable goals for the district. Action Plans with timelines will then be generated for each goal. Next, the draft Strategic Plan is reviewed by the stakeholders and Board of Education. Finally, following any necessary revisions, the Strategic Plan is presented to the Board of Education for consideration and adoption.

Message from Mr. McCaffrey – On October 6th the Troupsburg Volunteer Fire Department came and talked to our students about fire safety during our morning program. Our very own Mr. Jordan talked about kitchen safety and the importance of having a plan in case of an emergency. After the morning program our students were able to go out and tour one of the Troupsburg frontline pumpers and ask the firemen some questions. Thank you to our community volunteers for providing this education and opportunity for our students. Another opportunity coming up this month is Officer Mahoney will be giving his firearm safety presentation "Eddie the Eagle". This is a presentation that he does every year during one of our morning programs in November.

As a reminder there will be no school on November 10th as we celebrate Veteran's Day. Report cards will be coming home with your child for the first marking period on Friday, November 17th. We will be having our parent teacher conferences on Monday, November 20th from 11:00-6:00. Please be on the lookout for an informational paper coming home in your child's backpack. Our Thanksgiving break will take place November 21st-November 24th this year.

- Athletes will not be permitted to practice until all paperwork has been signed and returned and all physicals are up to date.




J-T Students Benefit from New, Improved Weight Room


Every ninth period a group of weight lifters can be heard grunting and motivating each other as they complete their workouts. In response to the initiative of Lou Zver and Chris Jordan, the school purchased new equipment that has been assembled and organized in a newly designated weight room by the maintenance team. The students and Mr. Ford, the Weight Training instructor, are excited about the new space and equipment. With the added free weights, machines, and rack, students have more options, don't need to wait to move to their next sets, and can make more progress toward their goals.

The aim of the class is for students to improve their health, strength, and athleticism. At the beginning of the year, students develop three goals related to the three different parts of their workout programs (upper body, lower body, and core), and use a daily log to track their activity and progress. They conference with the instructor every five weeks to discuss challenges, gains, progress toward goals, and ways to improve their programs. This year's classes have done a great job staying active and positive as they grow stronger and push themselves toward excellence. Mr. Ford is thankful for this improved opportunity for all the students to become healthier and stronger and for J-T's athletes to enhance their performance through targeted strength training.










The 2023-2024 school year will be filled with PIRATES, as the faculty and leadership team participate in several book studies using the PIRATE acronym.
